How We Spent Our Pupil Premium Funding - 2014-2015

The table below highlights where the pupil premium expenditure is allocated within the proposed budget.

The bulk of the expenditure funds our targeted programmes for children run by our teaching assistants. The expenditure of £58,264 represents 14% of our teaching assistant budget, while pupil premium children represent 32% of our children receiving additional support from teaching assistants. This shows that pupil premium children receive over and above the total of pupil premium funding in teaching assistant support alone.

The above expenditure included the Nest (our Nurture Group), the one to one and small group support provided by Julie Mark for emotional and behavioural support, the lunch club and our Disadvantage Subsidy for supporting children to access educational visits, residential trips, music lessons and other after school activities and clubs.

During the course of the year we have revised how the pupil premium is being spent in the coming year in relation to the setting up of a breakfast club, the extension of Julie' Mark's work and the ending of the Nest to enable further targeted academic support for some pupil premium children.

Impact of Pupil Premium in 2014-2015

As a school we are totally committed to all of our children making at least expected progress and as many as possible attaining level four or above in reading, writing and mathematics.

The results for our pupil premium children for the 2014-2015 academic year are shown on the tables below.

- All of our pupil premium children accessed their educational visits and residential trips in 2014-2015. **Attendance**
 - Attendance of pupil premium children in the 2014-2015 academic year was 93%.

Proposed Budget for 2015-2016

Our budget for 2015-2016 has seen a change in our provision to aim to improve outcomes for pupil premium children. Key changes are:

- The ending of the Nest to enable more focus on specific targeted provision for one to one and small group emotional/ behavioural support.
- Introduction of targeted breakfast club to ensure identified children have a positive start to the school day and are ready for learning
- Extension of lunch club.
- Using additional teacher for targeted support to release Year Six class teacher to provide intervention.
